"I still correspond with the family I lived with. I hope some day Frank and I can go to Germany on vacation and I can revisit Ludwigsburg."

GET AN EARLY START ON YOUR INCOME TAX

It's early in the season--but if you'd like to get a head start on compiling the figures you need for your income tax, here are some numbers concerning 1969 medical insurance premiums under the EMR group insurance plan. You will need these figures if you itemize your deductions.

EMR pays for the medical and life insurance coverage for each EMR-Telemetry employee. You pay only for your dependents' coverage in our group medical insurance. The amount you pay depends on your own personal situation.

The following table gives the figures for 1969 medical insurance dependent coverage premiums and should be adequate information for most of us. If you've been with EMR less than a year, or if your dependent coverage changed, please call Diane Fisher, Ext. 292, in our Insurance Office, for the help you need.

EMR DECOMMUTATORS ORDERED BY U.S. NAVY

The U. S. Navy has awarded EMR-Telemetry a second contract for a quantity of EMR Model 515/516 PAM Decommutators. The EMR Decommutators will be used in support of Navy missile programs and will be installed in trailers located at various Navy world-wide range activities.

EMR's equipment will serve the Navy in its conversion from FM to high rate PAM for certain surface and air launch missiles, and this data acquisition method will become the primary data source for most of the Navy's major missile programs in the 1970's.



The EMR Decommutators are made up of recently - introduced Model 515 PAM Synchronizers and 516 Demultiplexers. The new units are suited to applications such as the Navy's Terrier, Talos, Tartar, Sparrow, Sidewinder and Chaparral missiles.
