Test installations and demonstrations of EMR/Weston Fault Locators and Solid State Distance Relays are achieving favorable customer acceptance, according to Pete Farinas, of the Power Protection Group.

Successful Fault Locator demonstrations have resulted in orders and more test installations at a variety of locations: Public Service Company of Colorado; Bureau of Reclamation, Casper, Wyoming; Florida Power & Light; Consolidated Edison of N. Y.; Southern California Edison Co.

(Fault locators automatically detect and display the distance in miles from a utility substation to a point of fault--short circuit--on a high voltage transmission line.)

The recently-introduced Solid State Distance Relay, PDS 4000, will soon have installations at Duke Power Co., Florida Power Corp., and Wisconsin Public Service. This relay protects transmission lines and associated equipment from short circuits caused by lightning, insulator failure, etc.


"Our annual membership fee is giving us a lot of sailing pleasure and family recreation," Jim says. "We don't have the big investment of buying a boat or any maintenance problems."

EMR PROVIDES AIRCRAFT FLIGHT TEST EQUIPMENT FOR FAIRCHILD A-10 PLANE

EMR-Telemetry is supplying Fairchild Republic Company, Farmingdale, Long Island, with airborne and ground telemetry/computer data handling equipment for use in the A-10 military aircraft program.

Fairchild was the successful contractor for the A-10 aircraft after a dramatic "fly-off" contest between two planes developed by two major aircraft companies. Ten pre-production aircraft are to be built by Fairchild. EMR is providing vital instrumentation for handling flight test data for the first five aircraft.

"We are currently supplying a total of four airborne systems and one ground telemetry/mini-computer system for this flight testing, in addition to similar systems previously delivered to Fairchild," says Program Manager Wiley Dunn.

One of EMR-T's newest products, the Model 721 Telemetry Bit Error Rate Detector, is meeting very favorable customer acceptance, with orders already booked from seven different customers.

Our Model 721 is a special purpose piece of test equipment designed for testing PCM communications links, tape recorders and bit synchronizers, such as the EMR 720. According to Project Engineer Gerry Maki, "The transmitter section of the 721 generates all the commonly used (IRIG) PCM signals and simulates the signal degradation normally encountered in real systems. The receiver section includes error detection circuitry which displays system performance parameters." (That means the 721 will check out your system and tell you what's wrong!)
