MANY EMPLOYEES PARTICIPATE IN FIFTIES DAY FUN


SARASOTA, FLORIDA 33578

FIFTH SYSTEM SHIPPED TO MARTIN MARIETTA

Data Systems Division recently shipped the fifth Telemetry Processing system to Martin Marietta, Denver, Colorado. This is the final shipment on a large order for systems which will be used at both Denver and Vandenburg AFB, California. Total value of this contract is over \$1.8 million.

The system is configured around our 8385 Display Station and contains 8000—series PCM equipment, 4000—series FM equipment, EXPRT A/D and 741/743 time code units. In addition, various vendor products have been incorporated into the overall system.

"System capabilities include pre-mission, real-time, and post-mission modes that will acquire, demodulate, synchronize, decommutate, display and record data from two separate telemetry sources — one PCM and one FM," Project Engineer Walt Knopik explained. The five systems will be used for prototype evaluation, stage processing, post boost vehicle test, complete missile tests, and pre-launch and launch support activities on a missile program.

"Special thanks are due the many employees who participated in this large project," Walt said.

MOBILE TELEMETRY SYSTEM ORDERED BY CTA, BRAZIL

A new mobile telemetry system mounted in a van has been ordered by Brazil's C.T.A. (Centro Tecnico Aerospacial) to be used by a Brazilian Air force agency for flight testing.

The custom—made van which is parked near Receiving Inspection was sent here from Brazil. After equipment installation, checkout and in—house customer training, the van will return to Brazil, probably via C141 air transport.

The system, valued at about \$400,000, includes new 8000—series telemetry equipment with MicroVAX—based Model 8385 Display Station. Team members on this project include Harry Durrett, of Export, Project Engineer Len Zeiler, Paul Weller, Bill Cox, Gene Harbert, Don Worthington, and others.

In-house customer training and final acceptance testing are scheduled during July and August, prior to shipment in late August.

ROY GIBSON TAKES US ON A TRIP TO CHINA

"Would you like to go to China to do some training?" Ron Johnson asked me back in March. My immediate, enthusiastic reply was "Yes!" In April I was flying to China to conduct some customer—paid training on our Recorders.

The purpose of my trip was to provide the Chinese with additional training on our Model 9 Recorders with EDCS. Several of these recorders are part of a system which the Chinese purchased from an Atlanta—based company two years ago.

Enroute we landed at Tokyo airport and I changed from Northwest Orient to China Air. I soon found that foods, drinks, and atmosphere were decidedly different from any I had experienced before. There was a unique air of quiet determination and preseverance. Men wore "Mao" style tunics, and women wore the pajama style we associate with the far east. Several Chinese were dressed in conservative western business attire.


We flew into Shanghai where we went through customs. I noticed a large number of late 40's vintage trucks and cars which appeared to be in excellent condition. Later I learned that the Chinese manufacture these vehicles in the same style through the years.

As I stepped off the plane I saw many blue or green uniforms, making up about 60% of the crowd. I learned that only the blue uniforms with insignia were true police, and the green uniforms with insignia were military. Clearing customs was no problem, and the customs agent was very neat, polite and spoke English.

Next we flew on to Beijing (formerly called Peking) and I was met by the local STX Representative, John, who had been there for ten months. He was from Maryland and seemed relieved to have someone to talk with who knew Maryland. A taxi took us to my hotel, the Holiday Inn Beijing. It was comfortable by American standards, with all of the amenities — including TV with Miami Vice in Chinesel The hotel staff was exceptionally polite, very nicely dressed, and eager to practice their American English on me.

The next morning John advised me about the next leg of our journey. I packed rough clothes and some boxes of American munchies, and our driver transported us the 60 miles to the LANDSAT Receiving site at MiYuen.

During the drive I noticed the main six—lane highway. The innermost lane was for fast vehicles, such as cars, trucks, buses, and some motorcycles. The next lane was for slower motorized vehicles, carts drawn by horse or mule (the clear majority), and bicycles carrying everything from a family of four to eight or ten six—foot trees to be planted, wooden beams, bricks, live animals and ANYTHING else that could

possibly be carried on a bicycle. The outermost lane was for social purposes — people riding casually, a few walking, and many sitting to eat, drink tea, smoke and converse. This lane seemed to be the rest area.

The countryside was dry, dusty and arrid, with low rolling hills and numerous farm communes and villages. This part of China is largely dedicated to farming, with a great deal of the water supplied by irrigation.

When we arrived at the Receiving site I was most warmly welcomed by the staff. I had met these individuals two years earlier in Atlanta where they had been for training. After some small talk, we started right into the system checkout.

At the local hotel, we had rooms of early '50's decor with high ceilings, stone floors and antique plumbing. There was TV and a refrigerator stocked with Coke, water, juice, beer and wine. The accommodations were clean and comfortable.

Meals were served at a cafeteria hall adjacent to the hotel. Foreigners were served in a separate room by a waiter who spoke no English. There was no menu, and plates of various foods were placed on the table. We selected what we

wanted. I enjoyed sampling many unique dishes, often not really knowing what it was. Most often the food was very tasty and abundant, and I certainly improved my skill with chopsticks.

I was fortunate to be able to do some weekend sightseeing while in Beijing. The Chinese supplied a car and driver, escort and interpreter, and paid for the fees at the various places we visited. I felt like a dignitary receiving royal treatment.


One evening in Beijing the Chinese hosted a dinner at a restaurant specializing in Sze-chuan cooking, followed by a performance at the Chinese Opera House. The performance featured ethnic and cultural groups of China, each performing a song, dance or skit for which their area was known — an excellent way to do a mini-tour of China.


My sightseeing included the Great Wall and the Ming Tombs. It truly is a GREAT wall and a breathtaking sight. It stretches some 3,600 miles through Northern China and is the only man—made object which can be identified from space by the Astronauts. The Ming Tombs are in several locations and I visited just one location, where I was very impressed by the intricate carvings and ornate burial cloths.

Another sightseeing day was devoted to the Summer Palace and the Forbidden City, both in Beijing. The fabulous Palace had vivid colors, manicured grounds, and a very peaceful setting. The entire place seemed to have been designed with peaceful existence as its central theme. The members of the Royal Family must have enjoyed the ultimate in luxury.

The size and treasures of the Forbidden City were most impressive — six—foot high boulders of jade, carved in ornate detail...gold armor, weapons and clothing...pearl jewelry...gold tableware, etc. Truly a fabulous wealth of history, culture and monetary value.

Looking back, I wish I could have a month for sightseeing in the Beijing area. Never have I been treated with greater kindness, respect and good will than during my two weeks in China. I shall remember that forever.
