JUD STROCK PUBLISHES NEW TELEMETRY BOOK

Jud Strock, Telemetry Applications, has just published his third book on Telemetry. The 384 page hard-back <u>Telemetry</u> <u>Computer Systems -- The New Generation</u> by the Instrument Society of America (ISA) supersedes his <u>Telemetry Computer</u> <u>Systems -- An Introduction</u> which was published in 1983 by ISA and Prentice-Hall. PULSE interviewed Strock recently, and brings you his story.

Jud told PULSE, "Telemetry technology changes so rapidly that a five-year span is about the limit for a book on the subject. This one uses several of our products for examples--products which were not available when the earlier book went to press in 1982. These include our 5000 Series Airborne PCM, 8000 Series Ground PCM, 8715 Pre-processor, 8470 Digital Discriminator, and database software. In all, the book has photographs from about a dozen manufacturers to illustrate current applications of the technology. As you might guess, our products are used most frequently."

Because of many suggestions from readers of the first book, this one is expanded to include FM Telemetry and SCADA Industrial Systems. The chapter which Jud says was the most fun to compile was one on telemetry history in the United States since 1943.

Incidentally, you may recall that Jud wrote another book entitled <u>Introduction to Telemetry</u> in 1986. That book is very basic, and was prepared at the request of ISA to be part of their "independent learning module" series. It is not in the same class as this new, more thorough coverage.

"Even though only one name is shown on the cover of this new book, I consider it to be a product of the entire telemetry group in Sarasota," Jud says. "The world expects our company to lead the way in books as we lead the way in hardware and

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software. There is no way that a book from anyone in any other company could have the acceptance of a book from our division."


A technical book is not a sales document, of course. However, many of our customers and potential customers have copies of Jud's first book, and we know that several substantial sales have been influenced by the book. This is perhaps most noticeable in overseas agencies, where there is a lack of technical information on telemetry, and a book on the subject is appreciated even more than in America.

The acknowledgments preface to this new book includes this tribute to FWSI employees:

IT BRINGS OUT THE BEST IN ALL OF US

Balloons, yellow cards, a chicken and a band, United Way Brochures and "FWSI United Way 1988" blue fuzzies-these are the look of this year's United Way fund drive. Forty volunteers fanned out during the week of November 7th to spread the word and encourage maximum participation in FWSI's only company-wide giving program.

The volunteers are the heart of FWSI's grass roots campaign. Many have personal stories about how United Way agencies have come to the aid of families in need. One told about how she had a Big Sister when she was growing up thanks to the United Way and another wrote about the care, understanding, and therapy provided to a young family member who was brutally attacked and raped. 1988 Fairchild Weston Key Technology Symposium -A Real Success!

The Annual Fairchild Weston Key Technology Symposium is a mechanism to recognize the contributions of our own technologists and engineers. It is a conference designed to bring together their ideas and findings on technology with those of outside authorities.

The 1988 Fairchild Weston Technology Symposium was held at the Van Wezel Auditorium. The keynote address, "Evolution of Computer Data Acquisition Systems at the Wellsite" was given by **Mr. Howard Neal** of the Schlumberger Austin Systems Center. He explained how computers acquire data from geologic subsurfaces and other properties of formations through which an oil well has been drilled.

John Mallinson, for the University of California at San Diego, spoke on the future of magnetic recording. Dr. M. Dancygier, of Schlumberger Montrouge Research Center, compared magnetic with optical recordings. Guy Lelandais, of DAR -Velizy, discussed PEGASE Rotary Recorders, which are being developed in France. Ralph Wight, Technical Director of the Electro-Optical Systems group in Syosset, outlined the parameters of electro-optical recorders. Our own Mike O'Brien explained the architecture and design of the Model 8715 preprocessor. Ken Coonce, also of Data Systems Division, read Jim Massing's paper on the use of data bases in telemetry processing systems.

As usual, time constraints made it impossible to invite all qualified individuals to speak. Yet, there was a need to provide more information than could be formally presented in one day. Therefore, poster-papers were displayed at the bayfront campus of the University of South Florida at Sarasota. Louis Andreotta, Steve Crabtree, Mart Dismukes, Jim Fillion, Wayne Lockwood, Bill Mandakis, Phil Van Atta and Bill Waggener, Jr. of DSD, Steve Chew of ESD and Tom Traynor of EOS summarized their work on posterboards, and made themselves available to answer any questions concerning their projects.

The highlight of the symposium was the presentation of the Key Technologist Award during the Luncheon at the Hyatt Hotel. **Mr. Louis H. Pighi**, President of Fairchild Weston Systems, Inc., presented the prestigous award to **Gene Hart** of Control Systems Division for his many and varied contributions to our corporation and its development.

The symposium was exceptionally interesting and **Bill Waggener**, **Sr.** says to tell you that a fine time was had by all!

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ROUTINE BLOOD PRESSURE CHECKS ARE LIFE-SAVING



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

NO LONGER A CHOICE

From the semiconductor manufacturer to the technician who repairs or operates the equipment in the field, Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) is a problem for everyone involved in the electronics industry. In fact, everyone who is involved in the processing, assembly, inspection, handling, packaging, shipping, storage, stowage, testing, installation and maintenance of susceptible parts throughout the equipment life cycle, both at the manufacturer's and the user's facilities, needs to be aware of the damage he or she can do to ESD sensitive devices. While some facilities and locations may have a more severe problem with electrostatic discharge than others, it is still our problem if personnel are engaged in any form of electronic equipment manufacture, test, or repair.

Unfortunately, many people attempt to deny the existence of the ESD problem, or its magnitude for the following reasons:

- 1. Employees cannot see or feel a static discharge at their work station.
- 2. People believe ESD is a problem only with CMOS (Complementary Metal Oxide Semiconductor).
- 3. People believe that protective circuits provided by integrated circuits manufacturer's are sufficient protection.
- 4. People believe that once a part is installed on a board or module there is no longer a problem with ESD.
- 5. People attribute failure to other causes.
- 6. People believe that since we live in Florida and are accustomed to a high humidity environment, they are immune to the effects of static electricity.
- 7. People are just not informed of the seriousness of the ESD problem.

Awareness, then, is the first step. After a program is set up, the program must be monitored to insure that all personnel continue to follow the proper ESD control procedures.

For a complete ESD control program we need to consider ESD control program guides, the design and construction of ESD protected areas, the preparation of ESD operating, handling, packaging, and marking procedures, the development of an ESD training program, and certification of ESD protected areas, personnel, and grounded workbenches.

To implement a successful ESD control program it is absolutely essential to have the support of all employees. If people are convinced of the need for ESD protective measures, then, they will be willing to adopt protective measures toward ESD protection and make necessary changes in component handling procedures. The current goal of the Employee Involvement Team, the "Level Two Crew", made up of personnel from throughout the manufacturing facility, is to establish and implement an electrostatic discharge control program at FWSI. In the upcoming months all employees will be exposed to several preventive measures. Employee awareness will be stepped up using ESD pamphlets, videos and training courses. Your cooperation, support, and comments are greatly needed in order to maintain an effective ESD control program.
