New Directions is an alternative learning education system. Young people who have a difficult time adapting to our large public high schools often find comfort at New Directions. The classes are much smaller in comparison to a regular high school so students receive more one-on-one contact with their teachers. Everyone at New Directions (ND) is on a first name basis which provides an easier feeling between student and teacher which is often the problem in losing interest in school.

There are two sessions at ND of two hours and forty minutes each. Students must have a job since the hours they are missing in a regular school day are put towards DCT/OJT work credits. ND currently has an approximate 300 person waiting list. The graduation rate is very high and many students go on to college or Vo-Tech. If one does not have a job while going to ND, he or she must attend the vocational center to count towards DCT/OJT credit.

The unique aspect of ND is that all students work at their own pace. Students who are able to work at their own speed have the ability to grasp on to something that other kids might get either sooner or later than himself. ND also provides a nursery for teenage mothers. Everyone at ND is there to help and they definitely show it.

Here at Loral, we currently have five students who attend ND. One of our full-time employees, Kristi Weaver, just graduated from ND and is now a Data Entry Operator working in Purchasing. Brittney Anderson has been working in Human Resources part-time doing clerical work. Lisa Menendez is a part-time student working in Manufacturing Engineering doing shop core data collecting, and secretarial support to Lisa Powers. Lisa Miller is a planner's aide for Bill Gibson in Engineering Support. She sorts and collects data for MCS systems and also interfaces with manufacturing. April Wampler is a part-time student working with JoAnn Tonkin in Tech Pubs and helps with day-to-day paperwork and works with Word Perfect, Lotus and Keeps system. Lisa Meager works in Accounts Payable as a file clerk. All would like to continue with Loral.

EFFECTIVE SPEAKING

..AND other in-house courses

Presentation skills aren't just for top executives--they are necessary for every business person who wants to get the point across clear, confidently, and without nervousness, whether they're presenting a new idea...selling a product...or making a presentation that might be crucial to winning a new contract.

Speaking ability is among the most powerful keys to business success, according to a recently published study sponsored by a leading university. In a 20-year study of a cross-section of MBA graduates, effectiveness and ability as a speaker were found to be stronger factors in achieving success in business than education, length of experience or the career field those surveyed chose.

Recognizing the importance and value of this skill, SPS has been conducting a course in Effective Speaking. This course, based on the same format used by "Toast-masters International" began on March 13 and continues on consecutive Tuesdays. Course hours run from 7:15 to 8:45 AM. After six sessions, the participants agree that they have not only improved their presentation skills but they, as a group, have become much closer. The speeches have revealed interesting facts about important issues, hobbies, philosophies, etc. that, under normal circumstances would have never been revealed.

Thirty-four LDS employees have just completed two courses provided by Manatee Community College through the convenience of an in-house evening classroom. Nineteen students completed the Fundamentals of Speech Communication which was conducted on Tuesday nights from 4:30 to 7:30 PM. Fifteen students completed the Management and Supervision course which was conducted on Thursday nights from 4:30 to 7:30 PM.

During the summer months a survey will be conducted to determine which courses will be offered for the fall semester. USF Bi-County Center for Engineering is supporting a graduate degree program at LDS by providing in-house course material through the Florida Engineering Education Delivery Systems (FEEDS). Eleven LDS employees are enrolled in multiple courses for obtaining a master in engineering. The course material is presently supplied to the students on video tape. For the fall semester equipment will be installed to enable the students to receive live transmissions directly from the Tampa campus.

There have been several inquiries about the possibility of having a GED program in-house. A very successful program was held at LDS about five years ago. The Sarasota County School Board has been contacted and we should know soon if it can be offered again.



PHYSICAL FITNESS SURVEY RESULTS

Nautilus/fitness equipment and jogging trails were the big winners in the physical fitness survey conducted by Human Resources and the Facilities departments. Of the 460 surveys returned, 344 agreed that showers were a necessity, but even more people--392--voted for Nautilus and fitness equipment, with some specifying such equipment as stationary bikes, lifecycles and stairmasters, free weights, and rowing machines. Jogging and walking rails received 290 votes.

Tennis (149 votes), volleyball (138), and basketball (120) all received strong support, while horseshoes ranked a surprising 7th with 62 votes. Racquetball, swimming, aerobics/dancercize, and steamroom/sauna/hot tub each garnered almost 40 votes. There was also a sprinkling of support for softball, football, soccer, golf, rowing and canoeing, roller skating, table tennis, bowling, pool, skeet, karate, and punching bags.

The survey also revealed some good ideas and concerns. There were several requests for covered bicycle racks and bike teams and trips. At present, Loral supports bowling, golf, soccer and softball teams, but there is certainly room for more. Employees' thoughts about child care also came up, with some suggestions about a nursery and an "under the weather room." A complete survey of child care needs is being conducted in May by the HR Department.
