Sarasota County Purchasing Agent William F. Burke has written to notify us that EMR has been selected to supply a water quality monitoring system for the Sarasota County Health Department. A contract is now being prepared.

"We are especially pleased to have our own home county of Sarasota as a customer for our water quality monitoring equipment," said Water Quality Monitoring Product Manager William E. Hardman. "This forward-looking step by our local officials will put Sarasota in the forefront as a leader in water pollution monitoring, and will be an important advance in the community's effort to preserve our beautiful bays and estuaries," Bill said.

PRODUCTION MANAGER COMMENDS EMPLOYEES

"Results of our first quarter performance in Production were very satisfactory, and I'd like to be able to tell each person individually that they've done a very, very good job." Those sentiments were expressed to PULSE recently by Production Manager Jack Clark. He commented on the Production Department's response to the pressures of short cycle time, rescheduling to meet shipping requirements, and the generally cooperative attitude of employees about working overtime when needed.

"From hourly workers through supervision, I feel we've made progress in working as a team," Clark said. "Our volume of shipments has steadily increased, and all of the dollar commitments (shipments) in all three months of the first quarter were met or exceeded," the Production Manager said.

EMR-T TRANSMITTER ON SUCCESSFUL FLIGHT

The Department of the Army has announced the recent successful flight at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, of an experimental vehicle designed to demonstrate the very high maneuverability and control response required of an advanced missile defense interceptor. EMR-T has received word that our Model 3602 Transmitter flew successfully aboard the experimental vehicle, and supplied vital data on the vehicle's operation under extremely difficult environmental conditions.

EMR-T has supplied a number of these transmitters to McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Company, of Santa Monica, Calif., for this defense program.

An initial order has been received from Sandia, Livermore, Calif., for a quantity of EMR-T's new Model 410 Universal Tunable Discriminator. The brand new UTD was just introduced to the market last month, and a busy schedule of customer demonstrations is underway--both in-house and at customer locations.

"This first order for our advanced 410 Discriminator is an indication of the excellent customer acceptance we have been receiving," says Product Manager Kent Morgan. Sandia expects to use the EMR UTD in a data reduction facility, utilizing the Discriminator's flexibility and ease of changing frequency, deviation and data cutoff.
