


TWO NEW USA CITIZENS EARN CONGRATULATIONS

BOEING SELECTS OUR SYSTEM FOR AIR FORCE IUS CONTRACT

Boeing Aerospace Company, Seattle, Wash., has selected Fairchild Weston's Data Systems Division to provide a new state-of-the-art telemetry processing system to support the Air Force's inertial upper stage (IUS) missions. Authority to proceed on the first segment of work on this system was received from Boeing on December 15, 1986. The total fixed price of the contract award is over \$6,200,000.

This real time telemetry, analysis, diagnostic and distribution system (RTTADDS) will be used by Air Force personnel at the Satellite Control Facility (SCF) in Sunnyvale, California, to monitor telemetry during all of their IUS missions.

Our system will allow Boeing and the Air Force to control and evaluate the performance of the IUS during development and testing in pre-launch and launch phases of the IUS program.

The decision to locate the RTTADDS at the Satellite Control Facility was based on Telemetry Systems' ability to demonstrate that we could supply a cost-effective, off-the-shelf system that could meet SCF requirements.

The proposed RTTADDS consists of three basic parts: 1) A set of hardware and software called the "front end" system that accepts and processes incoming telemetry; 2) Main computers called "hosts" that accept the output of the front end system, further process the data, and provide outputs to the third system component; and 3) User workstations that allow the mission support personnel to display any of the data in ways that will meet their individual needs.

Thirteen candidate suppliers indicated an intent to respond to Boeing's request for proposal. Of those, only three accepted the challenge of performing the hands-on demonstration. Following the proposal submission, in order to provide this hands-on demonstration of an off-the-shelf system, a team of volunteers was assembled here at Data Systems Division for a dedicated two-week effort.

Proposal and Demonstration Team members consisted of Ken Slezak, Bob Buell, Kevin Lewis, Gary Schumacher, Gary Snyder, Jud Strock, Vince Supple, Len Zeiler and Tom Pittet. Larry Edwards provided West Coast Sales support.

Our demonstration was successful and was the determining factor in Boeing's selection of Fairchild Weston Systems Inc., for this contract. Data Systems Division's standard hardware and software products were also a significant factor in Boeing's selection of our proposed system. Everyone who has contributed to the development of these products helped us to win this job, Tom Pittet said.

The Program Team will consist of Principal Applications Engineer Ken Slezak, Bob Buell as Software Applications Consultant, Mike Messit as Hardware Engineer, Dale Roedger as Software Engineer and Program Manager Tom Pittet. It is anticipated that the Air Force will request additional effort under this contract and that in the future at least one more system will be required.

DIVISION CELEBRATING 30 YEARS IN SARASOTA

It was 30 years ago that Electro-Mechanical Research, Inc., began the move from Ridgefield, Conn., to Sarasota, Fla. The small electronics company selected Sarasota as the site for its new plant and the base for its future growth.

And grow it did -- from a few hundred employees in 1957 to a multimillion dollar high tech industry, known today as the Data Systems Division of Fairchild Weston Systems, Inc.

In December, 1956, temporary quarters had been set up in store fronts in the Sun Haven Shopping Center on Clark Road in Sarasota. There new employees were interviewed, Assemblers were trained, and the company's Sarasota operations started to grow.

Classes were conducted in cooperation with Sarasota Vo— Tech to train electronics assemblers in soldering and other skills needed to build the Subcarrier Discriminators and ancillary equipment which formed the backbone of the company's business 30 years ago. Some of the new Assemblers were officially placed on the company payroll in January, 1957.

One of those Sarasota Pioneers was Dorothy Bennett (Engineering Services ECO Manager) who celebrates her 30th service anniversary with our company on January 7, 1987. Some employees who started with the company in Connecticut are still part of our operations.

Meanwhile, during early 1957, a new facility was being built in Fruitville on the 90–acre site selected for the company's factory and for its planned future expansion. Later in 1957, some Ridgefield personnel transferred to Sarasota, and the Production Building was occupied. As the business grew, our facility expanded.

Today, Data Systems Division occupies a huge 290,000 square foot facility which produces EMR telemetry products and systems, Instrumentation Data Recorders, Aviation Recorders, and Signal Processing equipment for our customers around the world.

In future issues of PULSE we will feature stories about the people and the business that evolved since that move to Sarasota in 1957, as we celebrate 30 years of progress.

1986 COMPANY CONTRIBUTION TO SAVINGS PLAN ANNOUNCED

General Manager R. J. Keller announced this month that the company contribution to the Data Systems Savings Plan (formerly known as the Schlumberger Contributory Investment Growth Plan) will be 65¢ for each admissible dollar contributed by employees during 1986.

The 65¢ matching contribution equals the highest contribution level in the Division's history. Similar company contributions of 65¢ were made in 1984 and 1985. In 1983 the contribution was 35¢.

Company contributions to the Savings Plan are made directly out of Division profits. Generally, good years yield larger contributory amounts than lesser years for the Division. Mr. Keller pointed out that he and his staff felt that 1986 was a good year despite the fact that the Division did not meet all of its financial objectives.

Under the terms of our 401(k) Plan, which is part of the Data Systems Division Savings Plan, eligible employees may contribute up to 10% of their base pay into the Savings Plan. The company contributes 1% of each participant's admissible compensation for 1986, regardless of the employee's contribution. The company also contributes a minimum of 25¢ matching contribution for each dollar the employee contributes (up to 6%).

A statement showing your year-end account balance is included in our annual Personal Statement of Employee Benefits (Benefacts). These statements are usually distributed in April.

CREDIT UNION ANNOUNCES 4TH QUARTER DIVIDENDS

Based on excellent financial results for the final quarter of 1986, the Fairchild Sarasota Credit Union Board of Directors announces that the dividend for the fourth quarter will be 7% (A.P.R.). When combined with the dividend paid for the other three quarters of 1986, the effective annual dividend rate is 6.25% for 1986.

The amount of total dividends credited to Credit Union members' accounts for 1986 will be \$34,450, according to Treasurer Ed Annaratone.

"The actual results of our performance each quarter determine what the Credit Union dividend will be," Ed explained. "The Board is pleased to be able to declare this increased dividend, but members should understand that we cannot predict exactly what the next quarter's dividend will be be."

In other action the Board set Tuesday, February 3, 1987, as the date for the Credit Union annual meeting. Election of Board members and committee members will take place at the annual meeting.

Response to the offering of a Christmas Club has been very good, with more than 80 members signed up by early December.

FINANCIAL DATA TO HELP IN YOUR 1987 PLANNING

Under the Income Tax Reform Act of 1986, there will be many changes, including some changes in the 1987 withholding tax rates. Below is some information to help you with your financial planning for 1987. These 1987 changes will be reflected in your pay receipt of January 9, 1987.

SOCIAL SECURITY (FICA) TAX BASE CHANGES IN 1987

Social Security Taxes paid by you and also by the company will continue at 7.15% for 1987 -- the same rate as 1986. However, the Tax Base will go up to \$43,800 for the year 1987.

1987 WITHHOLDING ADJUSTMENTS

Employees should consider filing a new Form W-4 to take effect in January, 1987. You may wish to increase or decrease your withholding to reflect the Tax Reform Act changes that take effect in 1987 in order to avoid the painful situation of being underwithheld.

The new Form W-4 is now available in Personnel and the Payroll Department. The forms will be distributed to employees by February, with instructions for mandatory refiling by October 1, 1987.

SOME REMINDERS TO HELP YOU WITH YOUR INSURANCE CLAIMS

As the new year approaches, there are some important things to remember about handling your insurance claims for 1987.

ANNUAL DEDUCTIBLE -- You will need to satisfy your annual deductible in 1987, before any payments will be made on your insurance claims. There is an ANNUAL deductible of \$100 for an individual or \$200 for the family.

NEW FORM -- Effective each new year a claim form must be completely filled out with your first claim for each person -- employee and dependents. Complete information includes the spouse's employer and any other coverage. Our medical forms have been revised to include the spouse's date of birth.

BIRTHDAY RULE -- The "Birthday Rule" will be effective on January 1, 1987. This rule states that if you have a dependent child who is covered by our plan and your spouse's plan, the parent whose day of birth falls earlier in the calender year pays first. The plan of the parent whose day of birth falls later in the calender year will pay second.

SPOUSE'S COVERAGE -- If your spouse is covered under our policy and the spouse works and also has coverage at the spouse's place of employment -- the claim on your spouse must first be submitted to their company. After the Explanation of Benefits is received from the other company, then the bills and the Explanation of Benefits should be submitted to our carrier.

PRE-CERTIFICATION -- Employees are responsible for precertification before hospital admissions (THIS IS NOT NECESSARY FOR OUT-PATIENT SURGERY.) Employees may call the pre-certification number directly, 1-800-633-9900, or have your doctor call, or obtain a form from the Benefits Office. The form should be submitted approximately two to three weeks before hospital admission. (BENEFITS ARE REDUCED IF PRE-CERTIFICATION IS NOT OBTAINED.)

SECOND OPINIONS -- Second opinions are required on certain surgeries. Forms are available from the Benefits Office. (BENEFITS ARE REDUCED IF SECOND OPINIONS ARE NOT OBTAINED.)

CHANGE OF STATUS -- Marriage, Births, etc. If you get married, divorced, have a baby, or have children who become 19 or older, please call our Benefits Office to discuss coverage. A new spouse, or baby, must be added to your coverage within 30 days. When other changes occur-a divorce, or children reaching 19 or older -- please check with Alma Sanger, Ext. 5526, to verify details of insurance coverage.

WARNER ROBINS AFB ORDERS TDARS UPDATE

Warner Robins Air Force Base, Ga., has awarded Data Systems Division a contract for the upgrade to an existing ground telemetry system which FWSI installed some years ago. The contract is valued at over \$500,000.

The system is called TDARS, which stands for Telemetry Data Acquisition and Reduction System. The upgrade consists of hardware, software, and manuals.

AVIATION RECORDERS SCORE SOME FIRSTS

Our Aviation Recorders group has recently scored several important additions to their customer base.

Piedmont Airlines, Winston Salem, N.C., continues to select the Fairchild Weston Model F-800 Digital Flight Recorder (DFR) for their new aircraft -- the newest being the Boeing 767 aircraft. A significant breakthrough is that Boeing will perform the Recorder installation and hence certify our Recorder on this important new aircraft.

Piedmont has also specified our expanded parameter DFR - the second customer to order our expanded version which meets the proposed new FAA requirements. Ozark Airlines had previously selected this unit.

Another first is the selection by United Parcel Service (UPS), Louisville Ky., of our Model F-800 Digital Flight Recorder for their new Boeing 757FP aircraft. Again, this is important because UPS is the first customer for this new aircraft, and the certification of FWSI equipment on the Boeing 757FP allows future customers to select our Recorders without extra charges to obtain certification.

RENOVATION PROJECTS IMPROVING FACILITY

Several improvements are currently underway in the continuing effort to enhance our facility and improve work areas.

- Improved lighting is being installed at entrances and in parking lots.
- Remodeling the L Building and hallway is scheduled for completion by January 5, 1987. Configuration Data Management and the Engineering Document Center will move into this section.
- A portion of the west end of Telemetry Systems will soon be combined with our Signal Processing Systems (SPS) area. Some Telemetry Systems personnel will be moving into the areas currently occupied by Configuration Data Management and EDC, as fresh new modular offices are erected.
- As announced earlier, the new improved automatic wave soldering system is scheduled for installation during the year-end holiday period.
- Fresh paint has given the Cafeteria a face lift, and the Cafeteria windows will be caulked and repaired during the holiday shutdown.

Special appreciation goes to those employees in Plant Maintenance -- and other Departments -- who will be working during the year-end period, while most employees are enjoying the holidays. Thank you for your efforts!

Also, first orders for Cockpit Voice Recorders and Digital Flight Recorders for the new Airbus Industrie A320 aircraft have been received from Air France. Air Inter and Lufthansa have also indicated they plan to install our Recorders on this new technology aircraft.

Gulfstream Aerospace advised that the Fairchild DFR has been selected as standard for the new G-IV aircraft. Our CVR has long been standard on Gulfstream aircraft.



Sherife members meet monthly, socialize, and participate in a variety of events, such as the Tampa Gasparilla festival, Ybor City parade, St. Petersburg Festival of States, Clearwater Night Parade, Arcadia Rodeo, King Neptune Parade, DeSoto Pageant, and Bradenton Children's Day Parade.
